March Meeting Round-up

Ring 96 held their most recent meeting on Saturday March 19th. The theme for the night was rope magic. Our emcee for the night Cliff Gerstman opened the performances with a long piece of rope that he used to tell a story of a knot tying contest and how he won the contest using magic.

Bill Pearce came up with two pieces of rope, one long and one short. He performed the multi-phase routine called "DX Nightmare." The two ropes were manipulated together then proved to be the same

length and separate. He tied the two ropes together, and slid the knot off leaving one long rope. The rope was coiled up and then opened to show one short rope and one closed loop. These were tied together and ended revealed once again as one long rope.

Brad Ericson performed the Professors Nightmare. A long rope, a medium rope and a short rope all become the same length. While no evening of rope magic is complete without this time-honored effect, Brad brought a bit more to it. First the ropes, they were black ropes with white tips like magic wands. Next, he brought up volunteers to examine the ropes, and finally added patter to make the effect far more interesting.

David Fisher got a huge laugh when he came to the stage with a steamer trunk from which he pulled out a two-inch length of rope. Next, he took off a red shoelace from one of his shoes and launched into the routine "Sandsational." This routine involved a volunteer trying to cut the rope to different lengths. Included were a series of scissors that were gimmicked not to cut for different reasons. The shoelace was stretched, cut knotted and went through other very funny bits until it was finally given up on, thrown back into the trunk, and somehow reappeared tied where it belonged, tied where it had started on David's shoe.

Joyce Basch Performed her version of "Cords of Fantasia" which included a

story about native American brothers both trying to become the chief of the tribe. She had three volunteers as she told the story that took place in the 1830's in which pioneers had to be very aware of the territory. She placed several objects along a pair or roped held by volunteers. All the objects somehow feel off the ropes at a key moment. After that she completely changed direction and did a Saint Patrick's Day effect using a squared circle and a leprechaun doll.

George Reis came to the stage for a Ring on the Rope routine. He told a story that featured invisible knots in the air, and invisible holes in the rope. The Ring came on and off the rope with great success and he got his well-deserved applause.

John Engman did a jumping knot effect. He brought out two ropes one was white and one was red. He tied a white knot on the white rope, blew on it and it came right off. He threw it back on. He took it off again and threw it onto the red rope where it stayed. Here he untied it and the center section of the red rope was now white.

John Piercy referenced his days as a boy scout as he spoke of the qualities of different kinds of knots. He tried to tie a rope into a loop only to have the knots slide off and apart each time. Finally, he tied a square knot, teaching the audience how to tie this simple but strong knot. After cutting the rope again, the square knot impossibly slid off the ropes.

Marty Gorman performed Dan Harlan's "Awakening." He applied excellent patter to an effect hat presents similarly to the "Professors Nightmare" but uses a completely different methodology. Again, Marty's patter and high-speed moves made this effect a success.

Lastly, Roger Manderscheid came to the stage with his two grandsons and performed a Christmas themed version of "Cords of Fantasia," while wearing a Santa Clause hat. He had Christmas ornaments and holiday themed objects placed on the ropes and they all fell off at the key moment.


